Campaign Finance Reform: What Can We Do?

In addition to its work on protecting voting rights, the League of Women Voters continues its long history of advocacy for comprehensive campaign finance reform that began in 1974. Let's review our position:

The League of Women Voters of the United State believes that the methods of financing political campaigns should ensure the public's right to know, combat corruption and undue influence, enable candidates to compete more equitably for public office and allow maximum citizen participation in the political process.

This position is applicable for all federal campaigns for public office and also may be applied to state and local campaigns. At the national and state level the League's advocacy has taken the form of lobbying, testimony, grassroots action and work with the media.

In September, here in Michigan, representatives of the League of Women Voters of Michigan, the Michigan Campaign Finance Network, among others, testified against a bill nearing a vote in the Senate that would set state regulations for independent expenditure committees, more commonly known as Super PACs. While supporters argued the bill codifies the Supreme Court's 2010 Citizens United court decision, the bill went further, specifically allowing candidates to solicit unlimited contributions to supposedly "independent" Super PACs.

So, for example, an individual donor can give up to \$1,000 to a state House candidate's campaign. The candidate can then ask the same donor or a corporate

entity to give a much larger check to a Super PAC that is also going to support the candidate. Super PACs accept corporate contributions, making the original sources of their money very difficult to trace. The League's representatives testified that the language in the bill that allows candidates to coordinate their fundraising goes beyond the Citizens United decision and calls into question the true independence of the spending. Although not all of our local Representatives and Senators voted for this bill, it passed both houses of the legislature and was signed by the Governor, making it state law.

Protect the Vote Project

On Monday, October 16, LWVKA paired up with Mt. Zion Baptist Church, and ISAAC (Interfaith Strategey for Advocacy and Action in the Community), to bring a presentation on voting rights to the citizens of Kalamazoo. LWVKA represented Michigan in a 16-state, Public Advocacy for Voter Protection Project (PAVP) supported by the national League of Women Voters Education Fund. Our event was introduced by LWVKA president, MerriKay Oleen-Burkey and led by LWVMI President, Judy Karadjeff. Attendees at the event consisted of LWVKA members as well as leaders from the community, including a pastor, the President of ISAAC, Doug King, members of the NAACP, and Adrian Vazquez, Interim Executive Director of El Concilio (formerly the Hispanic American Counsel).

The intent of this educational evening was to raise awareness regarding the history of voting rights and efforts underway in the country to undermine these rights. We are seeing our "right to vote" become our "fight to vote," in this state and across the country through purging of voter lists, eliminating polling places, increasing wait times, requir¥£of photo IDs, and demanding documentary proof of citizenship. These efforts have denied thousands their right to vote, and in turn have threatened our democracy.

Redistricting Updates



The US Supreme Court on October 3 heard arguments in *Gill v. Whitford*, a case that challenges partisan redistricting in Wisconsin and could have implications for redistricting nationwide. LWVUS submitted an amicus brief. **Wylecia Wiggs Harris**, LWVUS CEO, participated in a rally outside of the courtroom. **Lloyd Leonard**, LWVUS Strategic Advisor, listened to the arguments inside the hearing.

Volunteers working with *Voters Not Politicians* continue to collect signatures in an effort to place a redistricting reform amendment to the Michigan Constitution on the ballot in 2018. The pace of signature collection is on track to achieve the needed 317,000 valid signatures by February 2018. **Bob LaBrant**, formerly of the Michigan Chamber of Commerce and longtime opponent of redistricting reform, **has announced that he will fight the proposal** in court on the grounds that the change it proposes requires a Constitutional convention.



Treasurer Q&A

Treasurers from 12 local Leagues around Michigan participated in a conference call on October 3, asking questions and sharing information on topics including in-kind donations, gift acknowledgement, and expense reimbursement. Among the three seasoned treasurers on the call was LWVKA's **Paula Aldridge**— thanks, Paula! For anyone considering serving as treasurer, know that resources are available to help you. What You Should Know About Per-Member Payment (PMP)

Currently the dues for an individual member of the League of Women Voters of Kalamazoo are **\$60 per year**. Of this amount \$32 are paid to LWVUS, \$23 are paid to LWVMI and **\$5 remain with LWVKA**. If dues are paid online using PayPal, which assesses 2.2% plus \$.30 per transaction totaling \$1.62, only \$3.38 remains with LWVKA. Please keep this in mind if you choose to pay on-line. Donations, grants and sale of our wares are the other sources of our funding.

When you join the League of Women Voters of Kalamazoo, you become a member of the National

League (LWVUS) and the State League (LWVMI) as well. The structure of the League parallels the representative system of government. Our local, state and national governments are dependent one upon the other; the base is the individual citizen. The League levels are also interdependent.

The Per-Member Payment (PMP) is the way Leagues satisfy the requirement to support the national and state level of the three-level organization. The PMP is a major source of income for LWVUS and LWVMI, providing partial support for advocacy, membership and organizational activities, convention and council, and board and committee meetings.

PMP is only a quarter of LWVUS/EF funds, but it provides the seed money that allows LWVUS/EF Board and staff to raise the other 75%. A significant amount of the funds raised externally are returned to individual state and local Leagues in the form of pass-through grant funds, membership and leadership programs and advocacy and other technology tools.
