News From National and State

LWVMI News President Sue Smith Advocates for LWVMI Positions--President Sue Smith testified in February at Senate committee hearings on Secretary of State Ruth Johnson's Election Law bills. Sue spoke against SB 751 and SB 754. LWVMI is opposing these bills which would suppress voter participation in the state. Sue and VP for Advocacy Judy Karandjeff met with Representative Peter Lund, Chair of the House Committee on Redistricting and Elections, to explain our opposition to these Senate bills which will be coming to the House. LWVMI invited a number of organizations, including AAUW, AARP and NAACP to join us in forming a Voting Rights Coalition to oppose these bills. On March 13, Sue testified in opposition to HB 5061 which, among other things, would require showing ID to obtain an absentee ballot in person at a clerk's office.

LWVMI Legislative Priorities for

2012 -- The LWVMI Board, upon recommendation of the Advocacy Committee, adopted the following as Legislative Priorities for 2012: campaign finance, election law, judicial selection (based on LWVMI's strategic plan); natural resources, pay equity and public school finance (based on member interest). These priorities will be reviewed throughout the year and changes will be made if necessary.

Equal Pay Day April 17--Equal Pay Day will be held Tuesday, April 17 from 12:00 noon to 1:00 pm in the Capitol Rotunda, with training starting at 9 am. Equal Pay Day was originated in Michigan by the Pay Equity Network and adopted by the National Committee on Pay Equity in 1996. It symbolizes how far into 2012 women must work to earn what men earned in 2011. Participants are urged to wear red. LWVMI is an Equal Pay Day Coalition partner and President **Sue Smith** will be in attendance. AAUW is sponsoring lobbying training for those desiring to meet with Michigan Legislators after the noon rally. A link to the lobbying training registration form is on LWVMI's web site. No registration is required to attend the noon rally.

Redistricting Campaign Update--

LWVMI is part of the Michigan Redistricting Collaborative. Last spring, as part of the Collaborative, LWVMI testified on the Legislature's redistricting plans. The Collaborative is continuing to meet and is waiting for the League to complete its study of the redistricting process. Once the League's new Position on Redistricting has been approved by the LWVMI Board, the Collaborative will begin its work of advocating for change in how redistricting is done in Michigan. In the meantime, the Collaborative is helping to publicize League redistricting meetings as a way to keep the issue before the public. A good example is Midland Area League's recent Redistricting Forum which received good media coverage in the Midland Daily News.

Amendment on Limiting Access to Contraceptive Services for Women Defeated!--The U.S. Senate

voted down (51-48) an amendment to an upcoming Transportation bill that would limit access to contraceptive services for women if any employer or insurance plan has a "religious or moral objection" to it. The League had sent out an action alert as well as a letter to Senators, urging opposition to this amendment.

League Asks President Obama to Respond to FEC Petition--The

League and coalition partners sent this <u>letter to the</u> <u>President</u> to follow up on the WhiteHouse.gov "We the People" petition. The petition was signed by over 25,000 individuals from around the country and called on the President to nominate new commissioners to the Federal Election Commission (FEC) prior to the 2012 elections.

League Opposes S.J. Res. 37--

The League and Coalition partners sent this <u>letter urging the Senate</u> to oppose S.J. Res. 37, the Congressional Review Act disapproval resolution sponsored by Senator Inhofe. It would eliminate the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) life-saving Mercury and Air Toxics Standards for power plants. This resolution puts the health of our children and families at risk and threatens the quality of our air and water.

League Opposes Keystone XL Pipeline Legislation--The League

joined groups from the environmental community in opposing legislation to approve the Keystone XL Pipeline. The letter said pending legislation would effectively turn Congress into a permitting authority, bypassing a robust environmental and safety review and approving a project for which a route has not even been determined, and called for the rejection of such actions.

Elections: The Link Behind the Wave of Voter Suppres-

sion Laws--*The New York Times* ran an informative editorial this week that links the

influence of big money on the wave of voter suppression laws sweeping the country, specifically connecting these efforts with the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) and their billionaire backers. <u>Read the editorial</u>.

Global Democracy: LWV to Serve as U.S. NGO Partner in G-8 BMENA Initiative--The League

has accepted an invitation to work with the United States government as its 2012 BMENA Initiative nongovernmental organization (NGO) partner. The League will organize 10 preparatory meetings that will take place in eight different countries in the Middle East and North Africa between April and October. These meetings will culminate in December with the ministerial meeting (the 9th Forum for the Future for North Africa, Levant and Gulf Countries) in Tunisia. Global Democracy Senior Director Zaida Arguedas is leading LWV efforts. The League's Global Democracy Program worked in Egypt and Tunisia in 2011 and has strong ties with local organizations.
