Year in Review - 2014-15

nce a year, we look back to remind ourselves how the many efforts of LWVKA members Make Democracy Work!

LWVKA during 2014-15 pursued goals in three strategic areas of focus:

- Issue Study & Advocacy
- Voter Outreach & Education
- Election Administration Processes

To support that strategic work, LWVKA members shouldered administrative and governance tasks, as well.

Issue Study & Advocacy

Goal: Advocate on key issues.

Our local League participated in the LWV of Michigan Education position update, as well as the LWV of the United States position update on Agriculture. In March, we offered a forum on food safety with Dr. Julia Brasher. Sue Nelmes and Jessica Reiser are participating in the local initiative addressing high infant mortality rates among African Americans, which is led by the YWCA. **Ruth Caputo** is active in the LWV of the Lake Michigan Region. She co-chaired the annual meeting in Traverse City last October, which focused on "Climate Change & Biodiversity for Lake Michigan." Also in October, LWVKA held a forum and then took a position on the City of Kalamazoo charter amendments ballot proposal, thanks to Terry Hluchyj. In January we reviewed state and local positions to see what we thought ought to be updated. We identified our local position on Education as lacking a section on safety, which efforts in 2015 led by Janet Jones will address.

Voter Outreach & Education

Goal: Increase voter registration and improve turnout of informed voters. Voter Registration

LWVKA conducted voter registration at community events: Mothers of Hope last August and the Pride celebration this June.

Year in Review—2014-15 continued

- Our members also regularly offer voter registration on local campuses: last fall at the two KVCC sites, at WMU, and at K College. In January, LWVKA registered 30 students at KVCC's winter kickoff!
- In months before elections, LWVKA also conducted voter registration two Tuesdays per month at the Department of Human Services office, and two Tuesdays per month at the Michigan Works office.

Voter Education

- The award-winning Young Adult Voter Education Project was offered again in Fall 2014 at area high schools, led by Georgiann McWilliams, Jennie Hill, and Kay Anderson. The effort to train and deploy teens as poll workers led to a realization that state law needs to be changed to allow them to do that work.
- With the YWCA, LWVKA cosponsored a Women's Equality
 Day celebration. Women's Equality Day, August 26, is the anniversary of the passage of the 19th
 Amendment, which gave women the right to vote. Keynote speaker was local resident and activist
 Carla Campbell-Jackson, who spoke passionately about barriers to voting.
- KC Miller organized a wellattended, lively forum last October for the offices of state representative and senator. Co-sponsored with Michigan United, YWCA, and WKZO Radio, the forum attracted 70 people who asked thoughtful questions.

- Voter Guides and the website
 vote411.org conveyed helpful information to voters for two elections, thanks to the efforts of
 Terry Hluchyj and her crew. One
 guide included the contested races
 in the August primary, and the
 other covered the November election. Over 30 LWVKA members
 and friends distributed 26,000 paper guides to over 200 sites.
- As part of a national project,
 Michele McGowan posted messages on LWVKA's Facebook page
 prior to the November election,
 urging people to consult
 vote411.org for candidate information, and urging them to vote.

Election Administration Processes

Goal: Identify and address current problems with voting processes throughout Kalamazoo County.

- LWVKA secured a grant through the State League for the Public Advocacy & Voter Protection project.
- The State League trained local poll watchers, six of whom monitored selected precincts on Election Day in November.

Administration & Governance

Goal: Maximize volunteer time, skills and energy in pursuit of our strategic goals.

<u>Leadership</u>: This past year saw a successful transition of voter registration responsibilities from **Karen Eddy** to **Merrikay Oleen**-**Burkey**, **Jennie Hill** and **Jen Richardson**.

<u>Communication</u>: LWVKA has a video on its history, thanks to **Carol Urban, Jack Urban, Janet Jones,** and **Ben Jones.**

<u>Fundraising</u>: LWVKA is newly participating in #Giving Tuesday and Amazon Smile, and at the 2015 Annual Meeting, voted to move ahead with a major, 3-year fundraising campaign.

Network Engagement:

Connie Ferguson serves as member of the LWVUS Board. She is one of 8 national Board members! Paula Aldridge served as a LWVMI Board member in 2014-15, and at the May 2015 State Convention, Paula Manley was elected to serve on the State Board. LWVKA hosted the May 2015 State Convention, with 8 delegates and many other local members helping and attending.

Membership:

During this past year, LWVKA began actively participating in the state's Membership and Leadership Development program. A state coach, **Christina Schlitt**,

helps our local team focus on how to increase and engage our membership. The local team includes **Jackie Wylie**, **Norma Clack** and **Denise Hartsough** with great help from **Chris Kuthe** and **Kay Anderson**.

Planning:

LWVKA updated its strategic plan for 2015 -17 with input from small groups and a large group session in November 2014. The Board refined goals and objectives in December & January. Point persons have stepped forward for several of the strategic areas of focus: Issue Study & Advocacy, Voter Outreach & Education, and Increasing Candidate Diversity. Volunteers are still sought for Election Administration. Fall Elections 2015

Transitioning to the new city commission election system.

A ccording to the City of Kalamazoo web site, six Kalamazoo City Commission positions will up for election this fall. The commissioner who receives the most votes will be Vice Mayor for two years and City Commissioner for two years. The commissioners with the second and third highest vote totals will have four year terms. The commissioners with the fourth, fifth, and sixth highest vote totals will have year terms. In the future, three positions with be up for election every four years. The Mayor will be chosen in a separate election every two years. Nominations have to be submitted by July 21, 2015.

As usual, LWVKA will conduct candidate forums for the City Commission races.

Transportation Millage

LWVKA supports CCYA millage request.

At the LWVKA's June Board meeting, Board members voted to support the millage request placed on the August 4 ballot by the newly formed CCTA (Central County Transportation Authority). The 0.75 mills requested (75 cents per thousand dollars of taxable value on all taxable property) would be levied on those within the CCTA boundary – the cities of Portage, Parchment, and Kalamazoo, the townships of Comstock and Kalamazoo, and several precincts in Oshtemo.


This millage would replace the 0.6 mills that Kalamazoo city residents are currently paying for bus service. The residents in the rest of the county have been paying 0.4 mills for line haul bus service if they live close to the city, and for Metro County Connect and the Community Service Van Programs, especially if they are "out county." Sean McBride, Director of CCTA, estimates that the countywide millage would decrease to the 0.275 to 0.33 range if state and federal funding stays near present levels. For those residents within the CCTA boundary their total transportation "bill" would be slightly above 1.00 mill when the cost of maintaining Metro County Connect and the Van Programs is included.

In addition to maintaining regular line haul bus service, the higher millage will enable CCTA to offer:

- 1. Sunday service from 8:00 a.m. to 5 pm on many routes.
- 2. Extended evening hours (adding two hours, Monday through Saturday).
- 3. More frequent service on selected routes.

These enhancements will benefit second shift workers, Sunday workers, those who would like to attend Sunday worship services, and, in general, all who depend on buses for transportation.

Local League support of this millage request is consistent with the 1988 LWVUS Meeting Basic Human Needs Position, which includes access to public transportation as an (energy efficient) essential, affording better access to jobs and housing for all citizens. Millage passage will bring in more state funding (30 cents for every dollar raised) and support a system that has been successfully "regionalized" with bipartisan agreement from township and city representatives. Ridership is up, and revenue from fares is strong (21% of 2013 funding). The millage rate would still be low compared to that of other Michigan cities of the same size. Finally, there has long been a need expressed for extended hours, Sunday service and increased service frequency in our bus system.
