2016-17 Annual Report

LWVKA members, you can be proud of all that you have done over the past year! New members, as you read what has happened this year, please note where you can join existing efforts or propose new initiatives! Accomplishments are described in each of the LWVKA's strategic areas of focus.

ISSUE STUDY & ADVOCACY

Goal: Advocate on key issues.

LWVKA programs and actions strengthened our relationships with local partners. On Women's Equality Day in August 2016 we heard from the City of Kalamazoo's Deputy City Clerk, **Shelby Moss**, as well as **Rev. Joann Mundy**

of ERAC/CE—Eliminating Racism and Claiming/ Celebrating Equality. In March 2017 we learned about Philanthropy & Public Services from **Robert Kleine**, former State Treasurer, Superintendent **Michael Rice** of Kalamazoo Public Schools (KPS), and **Laura Lam** of the City of Kalamazoo. In April LWVKA member **Ruth Caputo**, also a leader of the LWV of the Lake Michigan Region, explained rain gardens

and how they improve ground water quality. In **May Cathy Kothari** of the WMU Medical School along with **Grace Lubwama** of the YWCA described efforts to reduce infant mortality discrepancies in our county.

LWVKA also participated in the LWV of Michigan (LWVMI) 2017 study to update the State League's position on Government Finance.

In March 2017 the new Grand Rapids Geographical Unit held an educational forum on redistricting featuring LWVMI President **Judy Karandjeff**. It attracted an audience of over 100!

VOTER OUTREACH & EDUCATION

Goal: Increase voter registration and improve turnout of informed voters.

Volunteers in both Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo registered over 800 voters at sites ranging from Art Prize to college campuses to senior housing complexes. LWVKA secured a \$500 grant from LWV of the United States (LWVUS) for registering high school and community college students this spring and following up with them to encourage voting. Last fall, a crew of volunteers partnered with the Kalamazoo City Clerk's office to educate students and hold mock elections in 3 KPS high schools and at the Young Adult Program of the intermediate school district (KRESA).

LWVKA hosted candidate forums for the Kalamazoo County Prosecutor and Sheriff primary races and for 4 races for State Representative in the general election (6oth, 61st, 63rd and 66th Districts), the latter co-sponsored with Kalamazoo County Advocates for Senior Issues. LWVKA also hosted meetand-greets for all Comstock Township candidates and for Kalamazoo County Commission candidates. By request, LWVKA also held a candidate forum in St. Joseph County for State Representative for the 59th District.

Voters could access thorough information on candidates and races online at VOTE411.org for both Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo, and in the printed Voter Guide for Kalamazoo County. The VOTE411 page for Kalamazoo had 3,595 views, and the Grand Rapids page had 9,858! For the August primary, 29 volunteers distributed 15,075 copies of the Voter Guide to sites all over Kalamazoo County. For the November general election, 36 volunteers delivered 22,000 copies. LWVKA had volunteers check back after the election in an effort to discern which sites needed more or fewer Guides, and which sites should be dropped.

ELECTION ADMINISTRATION PROCESSES

Goal: Support full participation in our elections by all and oppose efforts to create new barriers to voting.

LWVKA joined 7 other local Leagues in Michigan to post trained poll observers at precincts on Election Day in 2016. A dozen volunteers watched the voting process at 8 precincts in the City of Kalamazoo and Comstock Township. LWVKA shared their observations with the LWVMI to forward to the LWVUS, and met with the Kalamazoo City Clerk and Deputy Clerk to discuss overall impressions and a few issues that arose.

Some League members serve as poll workers, and help to recruit additional workers. LWVKA is in conversation with the County Clerk about helping to orient voters to the new voting machines that will be in use later this year.

CANDIDATE DIVERSITY

Goal: increase the number and diversity of people who run for office.

LWVKA volunteers have identified potential partners for a panel focused on how candidates of color and women candidates have dealt with obstacles in running for office.

ADMINISTATION & GOVERNANCE

Goal: Maximize volunteer time, skills and energy in pursuit of our strategic goals.

Membership: As have many local Leagues, LWVKA has seen a jump in membership, from 154 in July 2016 to 183 in April 2017—an increase of nearly 20%! The Founders Day brunch saw a larger than usual turnout, with over 60 attendees, including 9 new members and 22 guests, several of whom joined on the spot.

Fundraising: LWVKA's fundraising efforts for 2015-17 have yielded nearly \$20,000! Generous donors have given or pledged \$15,000. LWVKA secured \$4900 in grants—\$4000 from the Fetzer Fund at the Kalamazoo Community Foundation, \$500 from LWVUS for

registering young voters, and \$400 from LWVMI for poll observation. A planned giving drive kicked off at the Annual Meeting in May 2017. These funds are crucial to accomplishment of our strategic goals, because most of our dues amount supports the important work of the League at the national and state levels. Of the \$60 each individual member pays in dues, \$7.20 stays with LWVKA to support our operations.

Communication: Thanks to dedicated volunteers, LWVKA has not only this Bulletin, but also a Facebook page for Kalamazoo, www.facebook.com/lwv-ka/, Facebook page for Grand Rapids, www.facebook.com/grlwv/ and website, www.lwvka.org. Media releases on all events garnered radio announcements on WMUK and coverage on WKZO and Channel 3. Public Media Network recorded candidate forums for viewing on its website. Perhaps most visible, LWVKA secured pro bono billboards for VOTE411.org from Adams Outdoor Advertising!

Network Engagement: Paula Manley and Ken Manley represented LWVKA at the LWVUS National Convention in Washington, DC in June 2016. Eight delegates represented our League at the LWVMI State Convention in May 2017. LWVKA member Ruth Caputo continues to represent our state in the LWV of the Lake Michigan Region. Paula Manley serves on the LWVMI Board, as well as a Membership and Leadership Development Coach for other local Leagues in Michigan.

Leadership: LWVKA benefits from the leadership, energy and skills of many members, whether they hold the title of board member or are on the list of dependable volunteers. We should send special thanks to Elianna Bootzin for her many efforts with the Grand Rapids Unit. I also thank and welcome MerriKay Oleen-Burkey, your new LWVKA president! I have greatly enjoyed and learned from my 3 years as president. I look forward to serving on the LWVMI Board with Paula Manley and Ken Manley.

Rain Gardens

A talk on Rain Gardens: Nature's Water Treatment Plants was held at the Kalamazoo Library on April 10. Ruth Caputo, a member of KWVKA, talked about how individual landowners can contribute to reducing flooding and improve water quality by reducing runoff from their property. One way to do this is to put in a rain garden, a place where rain water naturally pools or is intentionally directed and held. Rain gardens are planted with native plants with large root systems that help rainwater percolate into the soil.

Ruth talked about selecting the site for a rain garden, determining if there is adequate drainage, and designing and planting the garden. The garden will be less work if more aggressive plants (e.g. common mildewed) are kept out or planted once other plants have been established. Maintenance includes keeping non-native, invasive plants out and watering the first three years as needed.

Ruth showed pictures of her rain garden over several years and a list of plants in her garden. (If you want a copy of this list, please let her know.)
