2015-16 IN REVIEW

Once a year, we look back to recognize and celebrate how the many efforts of LWVKA volunteers Make Democracy Work!

During 2015-16 LWVKA pursued goals in four strategic areas of focus:

- Issue Study & Advocacy
- Voter Outreach & Education
- Election Administration Processes
- Candidate Diversity

To support that strategic work, LWVKA members cheerfully shouldered administrative and governance tasks, as well. If you would like to add your energy to pursuit of strategic goals or help with the administrative work, please contact the point persons listed under each category below.

ISSUE STUDY & ADVOCACY

Goal: Advocate on key issues.

Based on our local positions on government services and housing, LWVKA advocated for the County transit millage in August 2015 and Local Housing Assistance Fund millage in November 2015. Both passed. LWVKA hosted an informational forum in March 2016 on the Law Enforcement and Transit millage renewals. Both were renewed. Our local League enhanced its local position on Education by approving at the May 2016 annual meeting the addition of a section on school safety. During review of our local positions in January 2016, we identified teacher evaluation as a gap we may want to address at the local or state level.

In the area of Natural Resources, LWVKA's **Ruth Caputo** serves as one of two Michigan delegates to the LWV of the Lake Michigan Region. Ruth hosted a presentation in March 2016 by Jeanette Neagu of the LWV of the Lake Michigan Region on "green water"—algae blooms in the Great Lakes and their tributaries.

LWVKA joined Leagues from around Michigan, our state League and national League in vigorous support of the Democracy Agenda. The Democracy Agenda calls for action on: voting rights and voter protection, money in politics, and redistricting. LWVKA participated in national LWV studies on Constitutional Amendment in fall 2015 and Money in Politics in winter 2015-16, which laid groundwork for the Democracy Agenda. In fall 2015, LWVKA arranged 4 presentations on redistricting by LWV of Michigan, reaching 150 people. LWVKA hosted a presentation by **Rich Robinson** on Money in Politics in November 2015, and featured State League President **Judy Karandjeff** speaking on Democracy at Risk at our annual meeting in May 2016. 



VOTER OUTREACH & EDUCATION

Goal: Increase voter registration and improve turnout of informed voters.

Voter Registration: LWVKA registered 208 voters in 2015-16! We conducted voter registration at a multitude of community events and continue to receive calls for additional engagements. Events/sites included: Kalamazoo County fair in August 2015; fall 2015 kickoffs at Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo College and two sites of Kalamazoo Valley Community College (KVCC); Project Connect in October 2015; winter 2016 kickoff at KVCC; Glen Oaks Community College in

Voter Education: LWVKA organized two wellattended, lively candidate forums in September 2016. Co-sponsored with the Portage Senior Center, the forum for Portage City Council drew an audience of 60 and was available through Public Media Network. The forum for Kalamazoo City Commission was co-sponsored with Michigan United; over 100 attended and the forum was posted on LWVKA's Facebook page. Information about and responses from candidates for the November 2015 election reached even more voters through printed Voter Guides and the website vote411. org. Twenty-four volunteers distributed 15,000 Guides to over 133 sites around Kalamazoo County. 

Poll Workers Needed for August Primary and November Election

Poll workers are needed for the upcoming primary and election in all local townships, cities and Kalamazoo County. All that is necessary to become a poll worker is attending a 3 hour, paid training session. Several training sessions will be offered before the primary and election. You will be paid at least minimum wage. If you are trained to be a chair or co-chair of your precinct your pay will increase. On Election Day you will be expected to work 15 hours.

LWVKA to Mentor a Grand Rapids LWV

You may have read in the latest League of Women Voters of Michigan newsletter that the League of Women Voters Kalamazoo Area is mentoring a new Local Geographical Unit for Grand Rapids. A small group of interested citizens, comprising both Michigan Members-At-Large and new Kalamazoo members, is planning to conduct a Vote411 project covering at least one race in the City of Grand Rapids or Kent County for the general election in November. Another small group is planning to conduct voter registration late this summer. **Elianna Bootzin** is the liaison for the unit on the Kalamazoo Board. Report on LWVUS National Convention

LWVKA sent two delegates (Ken and Paula Manley) to the 52nd LWVUS National Convention held in Washington, DC June 16-19. The theme was "Making Democracy Work for All". Those of us who chose to arrive a day early to participate in Lobby Day went to the Hill to meet with our Senators and Representatives. The purpose was to lobby for the Voter Rights Advancement Act which is a bill to restore the VRA of 1965 which was gutted in 2013 by the Shelby County vs. Holder decision. Our Michigan delegation of nineteen people met with Senator Gary Peters and Debbie Stabenow to thank them for supporting the bill. Connie Ferguson, Ken and I met with Rep. Fred Upton's staff person that afternoon and discovered **Rep. Upton** is supporting a similar bill which is not as strict as what the League supports. His staff person welcomes more dialogue from the League to see if there might be a way to create a compromise bill so that the VRA would be strengthened.

Our days began at 7:15 am workshops and continued with plenary sessions, working lunches, evening sessions and workshops until 9:30 pm. Over 650 delegates representing leagues from 48 states including DC and the Virgin Islands were in attendance over the four days.

A key change in the bylaws was approved allowing those who are at least 16 years of age to join the League and no longer requiring U.S. citizenship for those wishing to join. The program for 2016-18 League-wide Campaign for **Making Democracy Work** was approved to work on voting rights and voter protection and money in politics. Delegates adopted concurrences with the position on Redistricting as proposed by the LWVUS Redistricting Task Force and the LWV Colorado position on Behavioral Health. Several resolutions were passed including: continue our longstanding LWVUS position on gun violence; support restoration of funding for gun violence research at the CDC; support statehood for District of Columbia; urge LWVUS consider signing on to an Amicus Brief with 21 youth plaintiffs from Our Children's Trust; support U.S. ratification of UN COP 21 Paris Agreement; and urge LWVUS to continue working for full implementation of EPA Clean Power Plan, especially at the state level, as a first step and should call on the White House to implement an updated science-based Climate Action Plan that stabilizes global warming by bringing CO.2 levels down to no more than 350 ppm by 2100.

We elected the new LWVUS Board. Our own **Connie Ferguson** is going off the board after completing her term and serving on the nominating committee. The 2016-18 budgets were passed without raising the PMP (per member payment). **Wylecia Wiggs Harris**, the new CEO of the LWVUS, gave her vision of redefining the future of the League as she talked about change and engagement.

A highlight of the convention was Banquet speaker **Ari Berman** who has written *Give Us the Ballot* which traces the 50 year history of the vote since the Voting Rights Act of 1965. This will be the first presidential election voters will not have the protections afforded by the VRA.

National Convention is a time to network with Leaguers from all over the country and to be energized and inspired. The next LWVUS National Convention will be in Chicago June 28-July 1, 2018. Make plans to attend in 2018! The next LWVUS National
